REPORT ON THE ASIA PACIFIC REGIONAL CONSULTATION FOR NYELENI GLOBAL FORUM ON FOOD SOVEREIGNTY

Event Overview:

The Asia Pacific Regional Consultation for the Nyeleni Global Forum on Food Sovereignty was held in Negombo, Sri Lanka, from June 9th to 12th, 2024. Representatives from 13 countries and indigenous communities across the Asia Pacific region participated in this four-day event, organized by the International Planning Committee for Food and Sovereignty.

Discussions and Knowledge Sharing:

During the consultation, participants discussed the various issues faced by their respective communities concerning food sovereignty and climate crises. They shared generational knowledge to address these challenges, focusing on sustainable solutions and practices.

Food Sovereignty:

Food sovereignty is defined as the right of people to have access to nutritious and culturally appropriate food produced in a sustainable and ecological manner. It emphasizes the right of communities to determine their own food production systems. This approach places those who produce, distribute, and consume food at the center of food systems and policies, prioritizing their needs over the demands of large corporations. Importantly, it includes considerations for future generations.

Agroecological Practices:

The consultation also highlighted the importance of adopting agroecological practices in daily life. These practices not only support sustainable living and growth but also contribute to the resilience and health of communities and the environment.

Participation from MIJARC Asia:

Representing MIJARC Asia, I, along with Ms. Deepthi Sofia from MIJARC Karnataka, participated in this significant event. We contributed to the discussions and shared insights on the importance of food sovereignty and sustainable agricultural practices.



“RAISE” PROJECT ACTIVITIES

1. UNDROP Training program & MIJARC Asia Coordination meeting

The MIJARC Asian Coordination Meeting was held from January 14th to 17th, 2024, at Kallathipura parish of Chikmagalur diocese Karnataka. This gathering brought together representatives from various regions of South Asia, including Nepal, Northeast India, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Odisha, and Sri Lanka. The meeting served as a platform for discussing key initiatives and fostering collaboration among South Asian states and countries.



A significant focus of the meeting was the training based on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Peasants (UNDROP). Over three days, a Miss Ashwini, High Court lawyer provided detailed explanations of these rights, ensuring that attendees had a thorough understanding of the legal frameworks that support rural communities and peasants. The presence of his gracious Most Rev. Dr Henry Dsouza, Fr Lourd Raj the Regional youth director of Karnataka along with Dr Krishna Kummari, the Global Advisor, Miss Ferosita, the MIJARC World President and coordinators Mr Ruffina and Mr Praful Kumar, highlighted the importance and high level of engagement in the discussions.

The meeting also emphasized agro-ecology practices, underscoring the need for sustainable architecture and ecological development. These practices are crucial for creating sustainable communities and addressing environmental challenges. Additionally, women empowerment was a central theme, with discussions focusing on projects that support rural women. A notable highlight was the successful agriculture project undertaken by the Kalappura Parish, which has significantly benefited the local community. This project serves as a model for empowering rural women through sustainable agricultural practices.



REGION WISE REPORT

1. MIJARC Asia– AP Activity

- On 12th January 2024, as part of National Youth Day celebrations and Plantation Program at Kumarapally village, Telangana. Mr Kummari Krishnakar, Mijarc World Advisor, Mr Venkat Swamy , Mijarc Telugu Coordinator, Fr Surendar and 40 youth and Children participated.



- On 24th January 2024, as part of UNDROP awareness and importance of nutritious food was given. Plantation of tomato, brinjal, leafy vegetable plants , drumstick plants, some of the flower plants were planted by the youth and children. Nearly 24 people participated. Activities are conducted and snacks distributed. The Program was conducted by Miss Divya Priya, Mijarc Telugu Coordinator.



- On 14th February 2024, Awareness program was organized on Agroecology and Kitchen Gardening at ZPHS Samudrala High School, Telangana. Conducted Quiz Competition and distributed prizes to the Students. Mr Venkat swamy, Facilitator and staff participated.



- On 20th March 2024, conducted a Meeting with local young farmers regarding UNDROP and Peasants Rights. Also discussed with Catholic workers in different fields like painters, brick makers, electrician, mechanics, shop keepers about their issues in Telangana Region. The program was conducted by Mr Venkat swamy, Mijarc Telugu Coordinator. Many youth participated and benefited.



- On 18th April 2024, organized a program at Telangana on Agroecology Practices at our change makers home. Pouring the water, using natural fertilizers, cleaning surrounding of the plants, fencing etc, during the summer season by Mr Venkat Swamy, Mijarc Telugu Coordinator.



- On 24th April 2024, as part of UNDROP, Social Activity and awareness Plantation Drive was done. As a team 12 members bought some plants and planted in our office at Vijayawada. Miss Divya Priya, Mijarc Telugu Coordinator lead the Program.



2. MIJARC ASIA– KARNATAKA

- **Youth Engagement at Kallatipura Parish, Diocese of Chikmagalur, Karnataka:**

The youth of Kallatipura Parish, in collaboration with the Karnataka Youth Commission and MIJARC Asia, embraced the opportunity for a new beginning. This initiative focused on educating the youth about their fundamental rights and duties as prescribed in the Constitution of India. The MIJARC Asia Youth Movement played a crucial role in sparking the interest of the parish youth, who actively participated in the studies and deeply appreciated their significance. As a result, they pledged to enlighten their community and surrounding areas about these fundamental principles.

- **JAGRIC Program:**

A five-week JAGRIC program was conducted, during which the youth studied the fundamental rights and duties of every citizen. A questionnaire on Rights and Duties was prepared, and the youth responded by answering it, raising awareness among them. Additionally, a seminar on fundamental duties was held for children, teaching them to respect the National Flag, the National Anthem, and to protect public property.

- **Competitions and Community Service:**

Various competitions were organized for children, including drawing competitions on nature and cleaning the surroundings, especially market places, bus stands, and hospitals. These activities captured public attention. Children planted saplings in gardens, while the youth planted saplings on hillocks, contributing to environmental conservation.

- **Christmas Celebration - 'Christmas Sambhrama':**

To celebrate Christmas, 'Christmas Sambhrama' was organized, featuring carol singing, a skit depicting the birth of Jesus, and a Christmas message. Entertaining cultural programs were also presented. The youth were honored with Christmas gifts, and everyone enjoyed the festivities.



- **Women's Day Celebration:**

The Women's Day celebration for the women of the parish included creating awareness about women's rights and their role in society. This event highlighted the importance of women's contributions to the community.



7. Laudato Si' Initiative:

In alignment with the Laudato Si' initiative, a plantation drive was conducted at Shalini International School in Chikmagalur, Karnataka. This effort aimed to motivate the younger generation to value nature and actively participate in environmental conservation.



3. MIJARC ASIA– NORTH EAST ACTIVITY

- The first of its kind MIJARC, UNDROP awareness program was held at Sishubari, Catholic Church, Kwilamwila Parish under Diocese of Bongaigaon on 11th Feb 2024, with more than 120 participants. The program stressed on providing proper guidance on agricultural related information to the peasants.
- The 2nd UNDROP Awareness Program was held at Christ King Church, Kajalgaon, Cathedral Parish under Diocese of Bongaigaon on 18th February 2024. The Program was benefitted by 100 participants.



- The one-day UNDROP Awareness Program was held at Seke Hemtun, Diphu on 24th February 2024 for the Youth farmers and for the farmers of the Parish. 61 attended the Program. The importance of the farmers' rights were made known to them widely.
- The UNDROP seeds distribution and awareness on Agroecology was held at Sishubari Village, Chirang, Assam on 5th April 2024. Mijarc-NE distributed ginger seeds to 5 SHG's to empower women economically.
- On 21st April 2024 Mjarc-NE under Youth Partnership Commission, organized an Awareness Program on Agroecology at St Francis Xavier Catholic Church, Bashbari Kokrajhar, Assam. In this program, the Youths planted saplings, and made a visit to the Agriculture farm to interact with the farmer. 45 youth attended

- On 28th April 2024, Mijarc-NE, under Youth Partnership Commission, organized Young Farmers training program at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, Magurmari Kokrajhar, Assam. The program stressed on (a) Organic Farming, (b) Climate change, (c) Rural Economic Development, (d) Improvement of living standard. 150 Youth attended.

4. MIJARC ASIA– TAMIL NADU ACTIVITY

- MIJARC Team of Tamil Nadu planned and organized a training program for MIJARC Tamil Nadu members on February 25,2024. The training focused on key areas including Natural Farming practices, the importance of Nutritious Food, achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), and the vital role of Trees in preserving biodiversity.



- On 18th March 2024, MIJARC Team Member Training Program was conducted in order to further empowering the members and it was fruitful to everyone. During the session, equipped them with valuable networking skills to leverage available resources. Additionally, dedicated in-charge persons were elected for the Women's Commission, Solidarity Economy, and Food Sovereignty committees.



5. MIJARC ASIA– KERALA ACTIVITY

- In collaboration with the Kerala Catholic Youth Movement (KCYM), MIJARC Kerala celebrated “The Shade,” a statewide initiative dedicated to Environment Day. This event included a series of environmentally focused activities throughout June which included Statewide Cleaning, Tree Planting Unit Level Vegetable Garden Inauguration.
- In alignment with International Women’s Day, MIJARC Kerala and KCYM celebrated Women's Day, focusing on recognizing and empowering women within the community. The event highlighted the achievements of women and created awareness about their rights and roles in society.

6. MIJARC ASIA– LAOS ACTIVITY

- **Thriving Ventures: Frog Raising and Mushroom Cultivation to Support the Young Lives Project in Laos**

Young Lives Laos, based in Vientiane, is dedicated to providing alternative educational opportunities to economically disadvantaged youth in collaboration with local churches and communities. Spearheaded by a passionate team, the Frog Raising and Mushroom Cultivation projects have not only generated additional income but also provided nutritious food for the center. Let's explore how these ventures are transforming lives and cultivating a brighter future.

- **Frog Raising: A Leap Towards Success**

In November 2023, the Frog Raising initiative began with a shared commitment to make a difference. The team established a purpose-built frog house and procured 500 froglets, accompanied by 10 free ones.

. After three to four months of dedicated care, the frogs were ready for sale in February. The initial batch sold out swiftly, highlighting the demand for this product. A second batch of 500 froglets was acquired in April, with expectations of future success.



- **Mushroom Cultivation: Cultivating Success, One Harvest at a Time**

In January 2024, the Mushroom Cultivation project took root. A dedicated mushroom house was constructed, providing an ideal environment for cultivation. In March, after patiently waiting for the spores to spread, the team harvested a remarkable 69 kilograms of mushrooms from 700 fruiting bags. Recognizing the potential, another batch of 1000 fruiting bags was acquired in June to meet the growing demand.

To stimulate sales, successful sellers who are students, interns or staff receive a 10% commission per kilogram of produce sold. This incentive acknowledges their contribution to the growth and outreach of the initiative



7. MIJARC ASIA– PAKISTAN ACTIVITY

MIJARC Pakistan organized a teenager leadership development program in Lahore on June 6, 2024, attracting over 30 enthusiastic participants. These young leaders are actively engaged in initiatives aimed at fostering positive societal change, gaining practical leadership skills, and learning the importance of teamwork and community impact under the supervision of Miss Marriam. This program empowers teenagers, typically aged 13 to 19, with essential skills such as communication, teamwork, problem-solving, and decision-making through interactive workshops, group projects, and mentorship from experienced leaders. Participants also undertake community service projects, instilling responsibility, empathy, and social awareness.
